


# Library borrowing rules:

- maximum number of books - **90**
- loan period - **90 days**
- late fees - **0.30 PLN** per day for each overdue book
- books with the “**CZ**” stamp cannot be borrowed. They must be read in the reading room.

- electronic student ID card
- 12 zł
- knowledge of rules and regulations



To find the book you are looking for,

you need to:

- check through the online catalog to see if the item is in our book collection, → **click**
- locate a book on a shelf using a shelfmark

You can search for a publication by entering the author or title. If you want to browse publications on a particular topic, use the subject keyword.



After writing down the shelf mark of the book of your choice, head to the library. If you have trouble finding a book, ask a librarian for help.


A shelfmark is an individual book number that identifies its location and position in the library's collection.





# The shelfmark is on the upper right corner of the back cover of the book.



All books and magazines with a shelfmark marked with a red sign “**Cz**” are intended for use only in the reading room - entered in the catalog as “Wypożyczane wyłącznie do czytelni”.



Using the written shelf mark, we find the correct library section (e.g. XIII) and then the specific book (e.g. 1230).

Library sections are divided thematically.

An active library account provides access to EBSCO's multi-search engine, which is the most convenient tool for finding scientific publications. EBSCO allows you to search multiple reputable databases at the same time, increasing your chances of finding a relevant article or book.



You log in to EBSCO as you would to a library account - using your student e-mail address and the password you set earlier.

If necessary, ask a librarian - we will provide you with assistance in logging into EBSCO and in searching for publications.
